Lisa Myers called the meeting to order at 1:02 PM.

The proposed agenda was accepted.

The **minutes** of the May 5, 2022 meeting of the board were reviewed and there were no corrections. Since there was no quorum, the minutes will be sent out for an email vote.

Interim Motions: Since the January board meeting, there was one email motion made by Phil and seconded by Marty; "The FOBWR board authorizes the expenditure of up to \$3,600 to stock the lake at Cannan Bend with 20,000 minnows, 2,000 blue gill, and 500 large-mouth bass paid from Cannan Bend funds." The motion passed with 10 yeas (unanimous).

Land Acquisition Update: Mike was not in attendance. A motion to renew the current Ernest Cook Agreement, with no changes, was made by Mickey Dufilho and seconded by Ed. It will be sent out for an email vote

Refuge Update: Cody noted:

Curtis noted that:

- Mowing continues.

Minutes of the Board Meeting

Friday, May 5, 2022 Venue: Gulf Coast Bird Observatory

Lisa Myers called the meeting to order at 1:12 PM.

The proposed agenda was accepted after the addition of several business items

The **minutes** of the March 11, 2022, meeting of the board were unanimously approved after minor corrections and a motion by Mickey and a second by Ed.

Interim Motions: Since the January board meeting, there were no interim motions.

Land Acquisition Update: Curtis reported that the Migratory Bird Commission has approved \$7 million toward the purchase of the 5,640-acre K-bar Ranch property, and they are considering funding an additional \$10 million.

FOBWR Funding of Refuge Projects: Cody (for the BNWR) and Curtis (for the SBNWR) were asked to present projects that could be funded by Friends.

Cody would like to replace **two shelters** that were destroyed or damaged by our latest hurricane. They would mimic the style of the Seining shelter in dimension, having sufficient length to accommodate two eight-foot-long picnic tables bolted to a concrete slab and have a metal roof over a frame of marine-grade lumber. Marty moved that "**The FOBWR** board authorizes the spending of up to \$15,000 for the construction of two shelters on the Crosstrails Loop of the Brazoria National Wildlife Refuge and for four picnic tables, with funding to come from the Brazoria McGovern reserves." Ed seconded the motion, which passed by a unanimous vote.

Cody would like to construct a **birding platform** on the east bank of the Cannan Bend Lake, accessed by a spur bridge from the existing Hickner Loop Trail. The platform would have one bench. Additionally, two more benches are desired to locate along the loop trail. Marty moved that "The FOBWR board authorizes the expenditure of up to \$7,000 for the construction of a birding platform on the east shore of Cannan Bend Lake and for the purchase of three benches for the trail and platform, with funding to come from the Cannan Bend Project reserves." Mickey seconded the motion, which was passed with a unanimous vote.

Cody noted that the current drought necessitates **pumping water** to keep a minimum water level in Teal Pond for waterfowl and other wildlife. The current diesel-powered pump at the Maddox Monument consumes about 48 gallons of fuel in 24 hours; at the current \$5.20 per gallon cost of diesel fuel = \$250 per day or ~\$7,500 for 30 days of pumping. A budget for the refuge is still pending, resulting in the lack of refuge funds for this current need. Marty moved that "The FOBWR board authorizes the spending of up to \$7,500 for diesel fuel to power the pump supplying water to Teal



Pond, with funding to come from the Brazoria-McGovern reserves." Longer term, the installation of a solar-powered pump will be investigated.

With the recent grading/pothole filling of the Crosstrails loop road, the Brazoria refuge's stockpile of road limestone has been depleted. Any significant rain deteriorates the road surface. Lacking a budget that would allow restocking of caliche, Cody asked Friends to consider the purchase of 16 loads at about \$20,000. During discussion, it was noted that the Federal Highway Administration conducted their periodic audit of refuge roads last year; such audits occasionally result in FHA grants for road maintenance and improvement. The board decided to put this request on hold pending the approval of a budget for the BNWR, funding by the FHA, or of the weather-induced need without other funding sources.

Similar needs of the San Bernard NWR were outlined in minutes (attached below) of an ad hoc meeting with Curtis on April 25, 2022. Marty moved that "The FOBWR board authorizes the expenditure of up to \$30,000 for maintenance and upgrades of public use facilities on the San Bernard NWR. The specific facilities are: repairing/replacing boardwalk on the San Bernard Oak Trail, re-decking the fishing pier on Cedar Lake Creek and modifying the floating pier to prevent accumulation of material underneath, refurbishing the Moccasin Pond observation deck, rebuilding a photo blind at Hudson Woods, and surfacing a trail spur linking the Bobcat Woods boardwalk with the pollinator garden. Funds would come from the San Bernard-McGovern reserve." The motion was seconded by Ed and was approved by unanimous vote.

Refuge Update: Cody noted:

• The standardization of all refuge websites went live on April 1st; for us, the address for the BNWR is now the Discovery Center rather than the historical. Misleading, refuge field office on FM2004.

- About 80 American Beautiful Passes are sold each year by the Complex; specific days and times to purchase the passes are noted on the refuge web pages.
- Cody expressed a special thanks to Oron and his crew for constructing the fishing piers at Cannan Bend
- Bryar Johnson, who has been the Complex's liaison on oil an gas activities, has accepted the position of Wildlife Biologist, filling the role created by the retirement of Thomas Adams.
- The new Project Leader has been filled, with an announcement to be made next week [welcome aboard Bryan Winton!]
- The spraying of cattail is occurring in Otter Slough and impoundments, as is spraying for yaupon near the BNWR field office.



- Construction of breakwater protection continues, albeit slowly per the dictates of the Army Corps of Engineers.
- Bill Stransky of the Texas Rice Industry Coalition for the Environment (Texas RICE) is developing a grant application for the rehabilitation of ponds west of CR208 near Mottled Duck Marsh. The grant will include inkind contributions of refuge manpower and equipment as needed.

Curtis noted that:

- Work will commence on the low water crossings on Ivy Road and the fishing pier on Cedar Lake Creek.
- Areal herbicide spraying of the black rail habitat is in limbo pending contracting a helicopter to substitute for the crash of the original contracted helicopter.

Tom reported that:

- The final DEEP session will be on May 17th with Freeport Intermediate 7th grade students
- A special field walk on May 18th will occur at the Peach Creek Unit near Wharton.
- The volunteer appreciation lunch will be held at the Discovery Pavilion on May 24th.

Ed Barrios will contact the Brazosport Chamber of Commerce to correct their information about trails on our refuges.

Action Register: The action register is attached at the end of these minutes. New action items are highlighted above and below. One action item was removed:

The Friends brochure has been updated

Financial Report: The Financial Report for April 2022 is attached to these minutes. Regina noted that:

- Phil received \$4,275 in donations for the Birds of Prey program in the March-April period. Expenditures for this year's program will be ~\$25,500 (which approaches the current BoP reserves). The \$12,000 annual donation traditionally granted from Phillips 66 has not been received. Marty will check with Phil and Phillips 66 to determine the status of this year's grant.
- Per board authorization, a contribution of \$1,000 has been sent to the National Wildlife Refuge Association.
- Our annual liability insurance payment has been made (\$2,454).
- Our auditor will be contacted in the fall, after Regina has reconciled our books.
- A TDECU debit card has been issued to Regina; this will facilitate payments.
- Our Form 990 has been filed for the 2021 fiscal year.

Web and Facebook: Dick reported that only minor modifications have been made to our web page; this includes adding a promotion of the upcoming open house at the Cedar Lake Plantation Trail. A page on the 2020 Migration Celebration Photo Contest will be added.

Weebly, our web host, is still less than desirable for ease of modification. Dick will explore the web hosting services of Proforma in Sweeny as an alternative. Protocol is now established for archiving files on the Weebly site; Marty will get with Dick to learn the process.

Maintenance Committee: Dick has received no interest from COT members to participate on the Maintenance Committee. He intends to meet with the new Project Leader for clarification of needs and objectives of where Friends might contribute.

Projects: Oron noted that:

- Construction of the fishing piers at Cannan Bend is finished
- Fallen trees across the San Bernard Oak Trail have been removed
- Existing funds already approved will be sufficient to build a short, ~100-yard boardwalk across a re-routed path to tie into the existing trail. This change would avoid rebuilding the 230-yard boardwalk section that was demolished.
- A new UTV is needed for turtle patrols as the current, heavily-used UTV stored at Mat-Pen, while usable, would
 not be worth repairing. Oron moved that "The FOBWR board authorizes the expenditure of up to \$20,000 for
 the purchase of a Polaris Ranger wide-body UTV, with funding to come from the San Bernard McGovern
 reserves." Mickey seconded the motion, which passed with a unanimous vote of the board.

Takeout Lunch Fundraiser: Marty reported that the net profit from this year's Takeout Lunch fundraiser netted a profit of \$4,897, which exceeded last year's profit by \$408. The results compared to 2021 and the 2019 Kickoff dinner are shown below. Increasing ticket sales and attendance remain as opportunities for future fundraisers. Customer satisfaction is high with the meal being popular with our guests.

Photo Contest: This year's photo contest drew 16 photographers who electronically submitted 110 photos and \$658 in entry fees. Photos of the 42 contest winners will be printed and mounted for display at the Brazos Mall on June 4th and June 11th. The cost for printing/mounting will be

about \$400. Mary is writing congratulatory letters and will mail them, along with ribbons, to the winners. The free-standing display at the mall will require staffing for security; this event also provides an opportunity to promote our refuges.

Refuge Saturdays: The last of this season's Refuge Saturdays will be held on May 14th at the Cedar Lake Plantation Trail. Volunteer staffing is arranged.

Other Outreach: Ruby reported that the next outreach event will be on June 16th at the Nature Center in Matagorda. Phil is organizing the program which will include Birds-of-Prey.

The Texas Master Naturalist, COT summer library program will begin in June. Refuge flyers will be given to adult participants.

Membership: Mickey's latest newsletter highlighted our five new lifetime members. To date, 72 people are paid-up members.

Monthly Walks: Ed noted that the next walk will be on May 18th at the Peach Creek Forest Unit; this will be the last of the season, resuming the walks in the fall with the arrival of cooler weather. Attendance of these walks has been minimal. Invitation has been restricted to FOBWR members, with the intention to provide a unique benefit to them. Ed will open the invitation to include TMN-COT members. He will also explore inviting employees of our business sponsors.

New Business:

- Ed's year-end solicitation letters sent to major area corporations resulted in \$11,000 in donations. In the future, he intends to expand this initiative with a prospective emphasizing the benefit of our refuges to our community and the challenges from budget resource constraints (a "Did you know?" statement). It was suggested that engagement of the community might be enhanced by the formation of a Citizens Advisory Panel (CAP).
- Our Partnership Agreement has been signed by Cody, and has been submitted to the Regional FWS office in Albuquerque.
- Lisa submitted a \$76,000 grant proposal to the NWRA for the development of three prairie parcels in visitor-accessible areas at the Brazoria and San Bernard NWRs. This grant used verbiage written for our recent grant request from NEEF, which was not accepted.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:52 pm.

MINUTES OF AD HOC COMMITTEE MEETING WITH REFUGE PERSONNEL

Purpose: Refuge priorities for future projects

Date: Monday, April 25, 2022, 10:30 a.m., SBNWR Field Office

Attending Refuge: Curtis Jones, SBNWR Manager; Roland Davis; Tom Schneider

Attending FOBWR: Oron Atkins, Ed Barrios, Ruby Lewis, Lisa Myers, Kim Richardson

San Bernard Oak Trail: We discussed at length the SB Oak Trail. Although a new path on ridges has been made to avoid some water, there is still a large area that almost always has deep standing water.

The trail is too long for a complete boardwalk; Curtis does not want to ruin the pristine woods with a concrete path and the cost would be prohibitive.

What is needed and recommended is a rehab of existing boardwalk and addition of benches. A rough guesstimate would be \$150k depending on the status of the substructure. This does not solve the persistent water area.

Hudson Woods: A high priority is repairing/replacing the Photo Blind / Viewing Deck. It is at least 10-12 years old and in bad shape. A concrete trail replacing the removed boardwalk trail is not worth the cost given the low visitation.

- Cabin: A walkway leading to the door would be nice; adding steps near the door (presently only a long dog-leg ramp; ramp needs no-slip strips/coating or straighten the ramp and redesign the railings to eliminate leaves
- Restroom: It will need to be replaced in the future
- Education building (EE): Needs a concrete slab in the front where it is hard to mow (about 6' x 30' or fill the area with rock and a slab in front of door only; add an outdoor or indoor sink (there used to be an indoor sink)

Habitat:

- Pipe replacement is an ongoing need
- Hiring contractor(s) for maintenance issues a possibility



- Overall, getting units in shape for black rail habitat
- · Areas of need:
 - o Buffalo Creek
 - Eagle Nest Lake
 - Sargent Marsh: fix subsidence and erosion (habitat restoration)
 - o Pentagon Marsh: fix levies to maintain fresh water (habitat restoration)
 - Less urgent: Wolfweed pavilion—corners of steel roof; swallow nest prevention (Oron will look at and make recommendations)

Expand Deer/Other Hunting:

- Planning going on now for youth hunts
- Need 8 blinds now \$2k each single, \$3.5k fiberglass double
- Another 8-20 blinds needed in the future
- San Bernard—Improve hunt areas for lottery hunts (waterfowl); need to replace the permanent blinds (maybe put on skids?) (these are the 8 blinds noted above)
- McNeal
- Bloodworth Units

Turtle Patrol: Need one UTV now (3-year life expectancy); this is the third of the 3 Friends planned to buy; Oron will address board

Top Priorities Summarized:

#1 San Bernard Oak—Repair all boardwalk that needs it (Oron and Roland will assess)

#2 Fishing Pier at Cedar Lake Creek—re-deck (refuge might have enough material for this); redesign the floating pier (water level fluctuates and difficulty cleaning out deposited material underneath)

#3 Moccasin Pond Observation Deck—(refuge may have enough materials to refurbish

#4 Hudson Woods Photo Blind—Turn into an observation deck only (maybe leave one wall)

#5 Bobcat Woods Trail link to native garden

Future (big ticket item)—water management; perhaps seek large grant \$1.5 to 2 million; perhaps tie it to habitat restoration

All of this could likely be accomplished with up to \$30k from McGovern funds. Those board members present agreed that we should seek board vote asap. Perhaps there will be enough funds left to buy one or more hunting blinds.

Not a priority to the refuges: Extending ACE interns past the summer (too expensive; the program keeps half of the fee)

Also not a priority: Any new projects that add more maintenance activity. We should seek grants that address current and ongoing refuge management needs. Maybe seek corporate funding.

Later in the day, Lisa sought and received approval from Curtis and Cody to submit to NFWF the preliminary proposal on three plots to be rehabilitate for bird, butterfly, and wildflower habitat. The deadline is May 5, and Lisa intends to submit.

Consulting Agreement

THIS CONSULTING AGREEMENT is made as of the <u>1st</u> day of <u>July</u>, 2022, by and between the Friends of Brazoria Wildlife Refuges (the "Client") and Land/Water Associates LLC (the "Consultant").

WHEREAS, the Client desires to retain the services of the Consultant, and the Consultant desires to provide independent contracting services to the Client;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises hereinafter set forth, the Client and the Consultant agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Engagement.</u> The Client hereby retains the services of the Consultant as an independent contractor, and the Consultant accepts such contracting, upon the terms and conditions set forth herein.
- 2. <u>Terms.</u> This Agreement shall have a term of 12 months commencing on the date of this Agreement, unless sooner terminated in accordance with Section 5 herein.
- 3. <u>Scope of Services.</u> The Consultant shall provide assistance in fundraising and strategy for protection of properties in Wharton and Fort Bend counties, Texas, adjoining the recently protected Peach Creek Forest, to further expand the National Wildlife Refuge System. Where feasible, Consultant shall seek to recover a 7 percent administrative fee for Client from foundation grants.
- 4. <u>Compensation and Expenses.</u> In consideration for the services to be rendered by the Consultant hereunder, the Client shall pay the Consultant compensation at the rate of \$100 per hour, plus reimbursement for expenses reasonably and actually incurred by the Consultant for or on behalf of the Client in the course of services. Any expense greater than \$500 needs to be approved by Client in advance. Compensation shall be payable upon the submission by the Consultant to the Client of an invoice indicating the number of hours and the nature of the services provided by the Consultant **provided that** Client shall only be responsible for compensating Consultant to the extent Client has funds in hand that are designated for the purpose set forth in Paragraph 3, above. Expenses shall be payable upon submission by the Consultant to the Client of appropriate bills and receipts for such expenses. Invoices and expense reports will be submitted and paid quarterly.
- 5. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be terminated by either party, with or without cause, upon thirty (30) days prior written notice. In the event of termination by either party, the Consultant shall only be entitled to compensation and expenses for services performed before the date termination becomes effective.
- 6. <u>Taxes.</u> As an independent contractor, the Consultant shall be responsible for payment of all federal, state, and self-employment taxes resulting from compensation paid to it under this Agreement.



- 7. <u>Laws and Jurisdiction.</u> This Agreement has been executed and delivered in the State of Texas and shall be subject to and interpreted by the laws of the State of Texas.
- 8. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings, whether written or oral, between the parties.

BACKGROUND

The Gulf Star Program is a public-private partnership that leverages contributions from agencies and businesses and is administered by the Gulf of Mexico Alliance. The Gulf Star Program provides funding for projects that accomplish actions identified by the Alliance's Priority Issue Teams and Cross-Team Initiatives in the <u>Governors' Action Plan for Healthy and Resilient Coasts</u>.

GOMA's Integrated Planning Cross-Team Initiative supports the implementation of adaptation, conservation, and resilience activities at the local community and regional scale. This includes providing improved access to information, tools, and resources to implement projects that include both the natural and built environment. Through this Request for Proposals (RFP), funding from the Gulf Star Program is available to the Integrated Planning Cross-Team Initiative to implement a green infrastructure project that will improve community resilience and the natural environment.

PROJECT SUMMARY AND SCOPE OF WORK

Green design and infrastructure practices such as rain gardens, living shorelines, marsh plantings, and pervious paving are a cost-effective way to help communities improve resilience and manage stormwater.
